Why Student Cheating is Rampant and How Technology Helps, and Foils, Cheaters

Research by a University of Guelph management professor suggests that almost 60 per cent of first-year students admitted to cheating on tests in high school, and almost 75 per cent on written work, according to a study a few years ago by Julia Christensen Hughes, who is dean of the university's College of Management and Economics and a leading expert on academic misconduct in Canada.

Interestingly, she told CBC's *The Current*, few of these students said they would be embarrassed to admit their cheating to a friend, or thought they would be caught, or receive any significant penalty if they were caught.
